BACKGROUND (CONTINUED)

Political and Social Landscape

- Political polarization and occasional violence.
- Nonetheless, Southwest has less active clan warfare 0 or organized militia groups than other member states
- Emphasis on stabilization and reconciliation. 0
- Formation of local governments through indirect 0 elections mediated by elders.

"Article 9 of the Southwest Local Government Law recognizes this distinction by stating "until circumstances and conditions allow holding popular local council election, traditional elders represent the clans residing in the district.""

ESTABLISHMENT OF SOUTHWEST

Constitutional Framework

- Emphasis on decentralization: empowering districts and sub-districts.
- Southwest state's constitution and local government law as guiding documents.

Formation and Structure

- Established in its current form in 2014.
- Consists of 18 population.
- Formation of local councils as a step towards democratization



Consists of 18 districts with a diverse clan

ESTABLISHMENT OF SOUTHWEST (CONTINUED)

Democratic Transition

- Indirect elections as a transitional phase from top-down appointments.
- Goals: political stability, reconciliation, and democratic 0 governance.

" Indirect elections transitioned these five districts from top-down and politically appointed officials to what one senior local government official described as "mini-social contract" Qouto



METHODOLOGY

Research Approach

- Utilized qualitative methods: interviews and consultations.
- Participants: technical experts, practitioners, policymakers, advisors, academics, and district council members.

Data Collection and Analysis

- Data collected in Baidoa and Mogadishu.
- Processes: tra and analysis.
- Supplemented by reviewing the Southwest constitution and local government law.

STABILIZATION AND INDIRECT ELECTIONS

Key Finding

Stabilization and indirect elections are intertwined, crucial for democracy, peace, and progress.

Quote

"Both stabilization and indirect elections are joined at the hip and their inseparability is quite understandable" (HIPS interview, 2022).



LOCAL GOVERNMENT FORMATION

Key Finding

• Formation of local councils requires significant stabilization efforts.

Challenges

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT AND RECONCILIATION

Key Finding

- Indirect elections promote reconciliation and social cohesion.
- Quote: "Unlike the indirect election at the federal and state level which has been a bedrock for violent confrontation, the formation of the local government in Southwest creates reconciliatory infrastructure" (HIPS) interview, 2022).
- Process:
 - Acknowledgement of majority groups.
 - Bringing respected community personalities on board.
 - Bottom-up process respecting community will. 0



INCLUSIVITY APPROACHES

Key Finding

- Innovative local approaches and cultural understanding promote inclusivity.
- Quote: "Innovative local approaches, as well as cultural and religious knowledge, were more effective in achieving women's and minority inclusion than constitutional clauses" (HIPS interview, 2022).
- Strategies:
 - **Engaging religious scholars and traditional leaders.** 0
 - Cultural and religious justification for political inclusion. 0
 - Awareness campaigns rooted in Islamic perspectives.



TECHNICAL EXPERTISE VS. POLITICAL MANEUVERING

Key Finding

- Technical experts are more effective than politicians in resolving contentious issues.
- Quote: "Technical expertise outweighs political maneuvers" (HIPS interview, 2022).
- Challenges with Political Influence:
 - Short-term political patronage.
 - Mistrust and manipulation.
- Successes:
 - Transparent elections led by technical teams.
 - Community-driven processes and decision-making.

POST-ELECTION CHALLENGES

Key Finding

- Operationalization of local governments faces significant financial challenges.
 - Quote: "An election should be a gateway to meaningful representation in terms of addressing public needs" (HIPS interview, 2022).
 - **Issues:**
 - Lack of budget for local councils.
 - Limited financial support and resources.
 - Need for training in budget management and responsibilities.





RECOMMENDATIONS

Future Steps

- Indirect Elections: Continue building democratic district councils. 0
- Transparency: Avoid imposing candidates to promote reconciliation. 0
- Innovative Inclusion: Use Mosques and Islamic jurisprudence for 0 democratization.
- **Empower Experts: Let technical experts handle election facilitation.** 0
- **Economic Studies: Analyze economic lifelines before council formation.** 0
- **Budget Allocation: Federal pressure on states for local government** 0 budgets.
- Publish Budgets: Ensure public scrutiny of budget expenditures. 0
